


My design: I have built the online hub at Comics Workbook with a focus on long term, archiveoriented useability. Along with this, the user interface aims to provide intuitive, serenditpitous learning for aspiring makers and curious readers.



Comics Database - Search and Browse

I've created two ways of engaging with the growing comics archive; browsing and searching. Browsing invites users to see a selection of new comics, allowing them to catch up with the latest the site's contributors have created. Searching allows for users to get a more robust handle on what they're.

The site connects a robust, well tagged database of comics to the front-end so that users can search via creator, series, or even the media used to create the comic.



Interviews, Reviews, and Tutorials

This site hosts an extremely wide range of content, as a result, it requires simple visual interfaces for searching via tags and post contents. For this I have built a well tuned search bar.

Juan Fernandez: So, how did you find yourself working on what has become Mimi and the Wolves?

Drawing from Life

I was always encouraged to draw from life, all the time. Just chairs lying around, peo-ple in school.. and I still do that to this day. Family re-unions, weation, in my gar-den. I just draw what I see. That's how i practice. It's like building a visual library. My hand is recording what I see. That way I can draw it again when i need to, without hav-ing to look at it. Since I was 5 years old I was looking at Velazquez and Goya, and the Rococo guys, all the Dutch paining, Iwoald draw on those books, my grandmas books! She got pissed off, but that's how I learned. I guess my love for drawing from that. I've been attracted to it. I love that it is something that I can do. It's something that is roomes out.

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Influences and Process

I was 19 and went to school at Miami Dade college. It was there that I took a few painting classes and drawing classes. I learned about Sergeant,

I have influences from all | the pre-Raphaelites, and Waterhouse. Klimt was always a big one, along with Mucha. From Art History, the baroque was a big influence . It is really dark, really intricate. Oh and Berninil Who else ... so many people!



When it comes to my own process, though, I start with thumbnails on paper, analogue. And I simply draw what comes to mind, right there, simple, straight up. After that, I scan that up and

blow it up on the computer. I do my pencils really gestural.

'How do I make you cry? How do I make you laugh? How do I go from this panel to the next that thing is really entertaining for me"

If I'm drawing a person, I think "What's he doing, is he screaming, smiling, is he serious?". I figure out perspective at that stage as well. That's really important. After that, I print out the pages on mixed media paper. It has a little bit of tooth, which i like. Then I just ink with a brush, a number 6.


I don't usually ink digitally, because it feels a little detached to me, along with the way it looks on the page. It's not as raw, if it's not as rich as organic media.
